Board of Directors Meeting - March 9, 2009

Present: President Conroe, President -elect G. Johnson, Vice-president Burdick, Secretary Marlier, Treasurer Fusco, and Directors F. Johnson and Phillips.

Funding for the Banner Project and an update on their design and material was tabled until the April meeting.

Carrie Lynn Phillips reported that the talent show to benefit Catskill Area Hospice and Palliative Care scheduled for April 24th at MCS had to be postponed until the fall, as Hospice Director, Bob Escher, said the Central New York Radio Group is sponsoring a talent show soon. The Board approved a \$300 donation for our event to be used as prize money for the talent show we will hold this fall.

Fred Johnson noted that District 7170 is sending a Group Study Exchange Team to the Northern part of England this summer. If any Morris Rotarian would like to be the leader of this team, Fred should be contacted ASAP. District 7170 is hosting a Group Study Exchange Team from Peru and Gary Johnson requested that Fred ask the team to present a program for our club.

The Board voted to donate \$270 to Nature's Classroom to sponsor one child from MCS to attend this week -long event held in Massachusetts in September. Current fifth graders are eligible to attend and all the funds must be raised to send these students.

The Board voted to give \$25 to the Major's Inn Foundation.

Discussion on the Linn Tractor Building Project was tabled until the April meeting.

Membership ideas were discussed. Suggestions included making sure all our newer members were invited to the Winter Bash on March 27; Having a "fireside chat " including all members, which was a highly successful event hosted by Sharon Bosco several years ago. Fred Johnson will contact her about hosting another when she returns from Florida; having a mentor for each new member; and using an interview instead of a classification talk for new members, which would utilize a Rotarian asking questions of the new member instead of the member having to give an actual talk.

It was suggested that we have a fundraiser to benefit Polio Plus. At this time the Board felt we had too many projects scheduled at this time to add another. But, it was noted that buckets for donations are currently located at our Monday night meeting, Nicole's Diner and the Morris Family Market. It was also mentioned that a portion of our \$1000 donation to the RI Annual Fund be designated for Polio Plus.

A request was received from the Hugh O'Brien Youth Leadership Conference to help fund a current 10th grade student to attend a 3-day conference in Albany, designed to promote and develop leadership skills. President Jeff will contact Mike Virgil to obtain further information so the Board can act on this request.

The Board decided that it wouldn't be feasible for Rotary to staff a table at the weekly Farmer's Market July – October. It was decided that a brochure, featuring Rotary projects and events be available at the Farmer's Market, Yard Sale Day etc. Fred Johnson volunteered to design this using a previous brochure as a starting point.

The Following amendment regarding District Policies and Procedures by Dr. Catrina Truesdale, President of the Oneonta Rotary Club, was read. It requested that the District Finance Committee shall oversee the withdrawal of district funds. Without exception, District 7170 checks over \$500.00 will be cosigned by two designated members of the committee, preferably the District Treasurer and the Finance Chair. Checks under \$500.00 can be signed by the Treasurer only. Every check will be issued only upon receipt of a paid bill or official form estimate of expected expense for the District. The D.G. shall have the authority to sign checks if one of the designated signatures is unavailable. This amendment will be voted on at the District's Annual Convention May 1-3 at the Regency Hotel in Binghamton.

Carrie Lynn stated that we should review our calendar of upcoming events at each Board meeting so adequate plans can be made. Our calendar includes the Chicken and Biscuit Dinner to benefit the Scouts on April 21st, the Annual Auction on May 15th and our Golf Tournament on May 30th.
