Program — Speaker Laurene Reichardt gave us an overview of the Catskill Center For Independence, a not-for-profit service agency located in the former State Police facility on Oneonta's Southside. The outreach group is a branch of the NYS Department of Education with the goal of letting those with disabilities to live independently. The

group also advocates to government bodies on behalf of the disabled. The Center is chartered for operation in Delaware County but their service area also includes Chenango, Otsego, and Schoharie counties.

Additional information can be found at the group's website, www.ccfi.us. All centers for independent living are consumer controlled. That means that at least 51% of the Center's Board of Directors must be individuals with disabilities. In fact, most of the Center's management and direct service staff are also qualified individuals with disabilities. When someone first contacts CCFI, the case workers ask many questions so they can make recommendations and create solutions that are in the best interest of the disabled individual.
