Follow-Up

For Your Summer Planning

The NYS Office of Parks & Recreation has announced several changes due to the economic downturn. We looked to former speaker Ed Winslow of Glimmerglass State Park for the local impact. His quick summary: Our region has some cutbacks. Camping will open one week later (May 15th). Hunts Pond and Oquaga Creek will be closed two days a week (Tuesday & Wednesday).

The official press release listed details that might impact the summer plans of MRC members. Changes for the nearby sites in the Central Region are outlined below.

Glimmerglass State Park: Winter tubing program will not operate during the winter of 2009-10; primitive winter camping will be discontinued.

Hunts Pond State Park: Campground closed on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Oquaga Creek State Park: The park and swimming beach will be closed on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The campground will be closed Monday through Wednesday.

Regional Campsites. All campgrounds will operate under reduced shortened seasons (typically shortened by two to four weeks). All campgrounds will open on May 15th (one to two weeks late for some facilities, except five weeks late for Chenango Valley). All campgrounds will close on Columbus Day.

Regional Historic Sites. Herkimer Home & Lorenzo State Historic Site will be closed Mondays and Tuesdays. The Lorenzo winter holiday program will be shortened to 5 days (previously an 18 day event).

How's Obama Doing?

Rotary's exchange students are our ambassadors to other countries. They are also good observers of how their home country is viewed from afar. Our current student in Belgium (Kate Meyers from Morris CS) was asked about reaction to President Obama's recent trip to Europe.



I was not fortunate enough to get to see the president; nor was anybody else that I know here in Europe. There has been a bit of talk about his visit though. The "Belgian view" of his trip to Europe, these days, is no more than, "Oh, that's nice. Obama is coming to Europe." Everyone here had a bit of curiosity about what he was planning to do and say while he was here, but not many people have gone out of their way to go and watch the president make a speech or anything of that sort.

My host mother said that if it was twenty years ago or so, then everyone would have been on the next flight to go and see the president, but now everyone here in Belgium is so used to seeing pop stars and famous artists that it is just normal and not anything to be so excited or shocked about anymore. Everyone does watch and listen to his speeches on the television though. Being that the capital of Europe is located right here in Belgium, Brussels, hundreds and hundreds of famous people have visited Belgium to do their shows/speeches so the culture is different nowadays and something like the president to come and visit Europe is just normal.

Even though everyone was not extremely excited about his visit, almost 99.9% of Belgians (I have not yet heard one Belgian say that they were for McCain or Bush) were happy that Obama decided to come to Europe. Everyone here believes that he is magnificent at giving speeches and winning the crowd with his style of speech, but many people are having their doubts or still waiting for some proof or action to back up what he says. Almost everyone here is pulling for him and excited to see something more from Obama than his speeches.

Many Belgians have trouble believing anything that Obama says because their own government is not in the best shape that it could be in. Many people have said that their political candidates say great things on the television to give a good voice and win over their supporters, but these politicians never fulfill the promises that they have made. This makes it very hard for them to believe all of the great things Obama has said because they've already believed too many promises for their own government that have never come true.
