How Rotary Works

RYLA Offers An Opportunity For Personal Growth

It was announced recently that Morris Rotary will be sending an extra local student to participate in the 2009 RYLA program. Traditionally, the students tell the club about their experience later in the summer ...but most Rotarians are really unfamiliar with the RYLA program.

RYLA is an acronym for the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards program. The idea started in 1959 in Queensland, Australia. Planned around Queensland's centennial, it proved to be a very successful event. Another session was planned for the following year. The good news spread. RYLA came to District 7170 in the early 1980s and the week-long conference was held at Golden Valley Sports Camp in Sidney in the early years. Now it's based on the Hartwick College campus in Oneonta. This summer's program will be the district's 27th annual event.

According to the RI website, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is Rotary's leadership training program for young people. RYLA participants can be ages 14-30, but most clubs and districts choose to focus on a narrower age range, such as 14-18 or 19-30. RYLA emphasizes leadership, citizenship, and personal growth.

District 7170 has narrowed the scope of RYLA to high school juniors, similar to other "junior experiences" like Boys State, Girls State, and a host of specialty seminars for promising students. This will be the largest session ever with 117 participants; past sessions had been limited to 110 students. In all, 36 Rotary clubs provide scholarships to high school juniors. The tab for tuition and lodging is currently \$350 per attendee. Clubs like Binghamton, Sidney, Endwell, and Norwich send six students, according to RYLA Treasurer Craig Lawson. Other groups send five, four, or fewer students depending on the club's finances and by the number of high schools served by that particular Rotary club.

Most members of the RYLA staff are area high school teachers. Many of the guest speakers have direct ties with Rotary. Several were former Rotary exchange students. In fact, one of the most popular speakers is Duke Fisher of Bainbridge who presents a unit on Managing Conflict. He starts his presentation by explaining that he reserves the date of his RYLA presentation each year as his way of "paying back" the YEP experience that Rotary gave to him several years ago.

Other presentations are made on such varied topics as "Actions and Words" by Diane Munroe; "Motivation" by Tom Morgan; "Decisions, Decisions" by Robb & Lee; "Values and Ethics in Leadership" by Greg Krikorian; and "Career Exploration: A New Age approach" by Lou Shields. In addition, the students produce a newspaper, have a public speaking contest, create band and chorus shows, and take such electives as photography, scrapbooking, computers, and wall painting. Director Julie Lambiaso says a community volunteerism component has been added. "Last year, we collected books to send to New Orleans and to the local Salvation Army office. We'll have a different community service project for this year that will be announced soon."

Lambiaso says the staff is gearing up for a unit on handling such community tragedies as the recent shootings in Binghamton and/or an auto accident that could strike a school, devastating a close-knit group of friends.

For many of the students, it will be their first experience on a college campus. The students will live in dorms with roommates <u>not</u> from their home schools, eat in the cafeteria, have use of other Hartwick College facilities such as the library, computer and technology rooms, fitness center and pool, and large meeting rooms.

The RYLA experience will conclude with an awards banquet for parents and friends on Friday evening, July 3. Although reservations must be made in advance, this event is open to all district Rotarians. "The entire evening program will be prepared by the students," says Lambiaso. "It's a great way for everyone to see some outstanding student work ...and to see the value that's coming from your club's investment."

How do other Rotary districts do it?

District 7190 – Capitol Region Rotary The program is open only to high school juniors but they meet throughout the academic year (October through April). The first and last meetings are full-day; the other five sessions are halfday seminars. RYLA is not located on a college campus.

District 7150 – Syracuse, Utica and Central New York RYLA is a mid-summer Friday-Sunday weekend event for high school juniors. This year, it's set for July 10-12 at Cazenovia College.

District 7120 – Finger Lakes Rotary RYLA is a weeklong seminar held at Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) right after graduation (June 28-July 2). It is open to students "of high school age".

District 7090 – Niagara Frontier and Buffalo Their RYLA is geared to 40-45 post-secondary students and recent graduates ages 19-25. The event will be held June 14-20 on the campus of SUNY Fredonia.

District 7210 – Catskill Mountains and Hudson Valley The week-long seminar is held for high school sophomores at Mount St. Mary College in Newburgh.

District 7230 – Westchester County and NYC RYLA is open to high school sophomores and juniors at a nature camp near Ashokan in the Catskill Mountains. The High Adventure experience is held over a weekend in October.
