

Yes, he went into cardiac arrest. But by the miracle of God and some quick CPR by Pete Gould and the Oneonta Fire Department EMTs he is well on his way to recovery. Yesterday he was taken off the respirator and sat up ...and asked for his cell phone because he had two businesses to run!

He is out of ICU. He will be in Fox for a few days and at some time will have to go to Wilson Hospital to have a defibrillator implanted.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards

RYLA Programs Are Tailored To Local Conditions

With the district's RYLA program coming up at the end of June, we devoted a full page of last week's newsletter to the week-long leadership exercise to be held at Hartwick College. RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) started in Australia in 1959. The program became very popular and rapidly expanded to other areas. It became sanctioned by Rotary International in 1971. To this day, RYLA varies from district to district to meet local needs and to take advantage of available talents. Three districts in New York State show significant differences.

District 7190 – Albany Just as in District 7170, the Capitol Region RYLA program is open only to high school juniors but they meet throughout the academic year (October through April). The first and last meetings are full-day; the other five sessions are half-day seminars. And RYLA is not located on a college campus. It meets in spaces located across the district that reaches from neighboring Schoharie County to the northern tip of Lake George. The program is fully run by Rotarians with about half of the district's 46 clubs offering scholarships.

Program chairman **Nick George** of Hudson Falls Rotary recalls a long-standing relationship with District 7170. "Your district supplied the format that you use to us back in 2003. We followed that format for two years. When I was asked to get involved we sat down and discussed how to make the program better. From those conversations, listening to the feedback from the students who had participated in the program, and my years of experience as a trainer, I designed the yearlong format. The key to it is giving students a little to learn ...then encouraging them to go back and 'try it out' in real life. At the next session we discussed what worked, what didn't, and how it might be improved. This has created very strong results for our students. We listen and learn from the students as well every year; we are always evolving the program."

District 7150 – Syracuse RYLA is a mid-summer Friday-Sunday weekend event. This year, it's scheduled for July 10-12. The conference was moved from Utica's Mohawk Valley Community College to centrally-located Cazenovia College about five years ago. "We bring in some very influential presenters," notes Chairman **Larry Richardson.**

They take advantage of local talent with one of the favorite speakers being former SU football star Tim Ahern. Richardson's voice brightens as he explains, "He's owner of Ahern, Murphy & Associates, a company that teaches corporate executives how to be leaders. Tim's topic for us is *Developing the Attitude of a Champion*."

The District 7150 RYLA sessions are open to high school juniors with an occasional sophomore accepted. Seniors are not welcome because there's a community service component to be completed during the following school year. Richardson, of Chittenango Rotary, has found that seniors are mentally heading off to college and rarely focus on the service project. Last year, 26 of the district's 45 clubs funded 38 students according to their website.

District 7090 – Buffalo. District 7090 is an "international district" with several clubs in western New York and the remainder in Ontario, Canada. They offered RYLA to a wide range of ages but found that teens didn't mix with older young professionals. The solution was to split the group ...and create two age-appropriate programs.

RYLA was kept as a week-long experience with a strong emphasis on professional development. It is offered to the 19-25 set so they bring a variety of life experiences to the conference. The program is held on the SUNY Fredonia campus in June with many participants being upper-level college students and others already out in the working world, according to US RYLA chairman **Donald Lang**. The program is an intense week for 40-45 young professionals, the kind of training that corporations offer to their executives. This year's session is already sold out.

"About 4 years ago, we started a program called Slap Shot for 16-18 year old high school students. This is held at Canterbury Hills Conference Centre in Ancaster, Ontario on May 1-3. We have to limit it to the 100 best applicants. It has become very popular," says Lang. "In addition to the classroom leadership sessions, the facility has a high adventure ropes course. Catering this weekend event to teens while keeping RYLA for young professionals was a very smart move. And it has been strongly supported by our Rotary clubs."
