The Hotels At Chenango Lake

Today, Chenango Lake outside of Norwich is a quiet body of water surrounded by private cottages. As part of the City of Norwich water system, there are some restrictions to maintain the water quality but mostly it's like so many other lakes in Central New York with "cottages" increasing becoming year-round homes. There are no commercial facilities on the rural lake.

What many residents don't know is that the lake has a glorious past. Hotels once made it a popular nightspot for the locals. And, back in the days when Norwich had scheduled passenger rail service, it was a destination for summer vacationers for the New York metro area.



Christine Gibson is a Favetteville resident who spends every summer at Chenango Lake with her husband Ed. The Gibsons have a long association with the area; Ed's uncle Stan was a fabled NHS history teacher who had a fondness for all of rural New York, especially Chenango Lake, "Uncle Stan" had a large collection of pictures and clippinas. From there, Mrs.

Gibson combed other historical records and private archives to write two books about Chenango Lake. The first text, on the lake's hotels, is in its second printing. Another book on the lake's historic cottages goes to the printer later this summer. Both will be available at the Chenango County Museum in Norwich.

Mrs. Gibson, along with the museum's Diane Hamblin, gave a brief history and shared pictures of the hotels that were popular back around 1900. The first was the Chenango Lake House, followed by the Hotel Loomis (which

became the Colonel's Inn when Mr. Loomis passed away), the Lakeview Hotel, and the Woodside Inn. All have structures have passed from the scene today but many of the area's seniors can recall attending frequent dances, group events, and church picnics at "the lake". Mrs. Gibson's book captures the history and many interesting personal stories of the by-gone era.
