Group Study Exchange

The District 7170 Team Is On The Road In Merry Old England

The district's Group Study Exchange (GSE) team is currently in Northeastern England touring District 1030. It's slightly larger than District 7170 with 69 clubs and over 2,100 members. The local group just passed the mid-point of it's month-long stay.

According to the Rotary International website, the Rotary Foundation's Group Study Exchange (GSE) program is a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for businesspeople and professionals between the ages of 25 and 40 who are in the early stages of their careers. The program provides travel grants for teams to exchange visits in paired areas of different countries. For four to six weeks, team members experience the host country's culture and institutions, observe how their vocations are practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas.

Dryden Rotarian **Terry Donlick** of Freeville is the leader of the current outbound group. Her team members include Amy Parker (a LPN living in Cincinnatus but sponsored by the Cortland club), Mrs. Vickey Beaver of Dryden, owner of a family electronics business Jeremy Matviak of Sidney, and Oneonta's Tim Hayes. The group left Syracuse on September 19; they'll return on October 17.

You can follow the team's travels via their blog. Their postings range from serious discussions to humor. All writings give the "American point of view" of Mother England. Very good photographs, too.
