It is very much appreciated.* **Program** — Roger Ashworth was an inspiration to his Bainbridge-Guilford students during his decades of teaching; he continues to be a positive example to everyone who enjoys life. Over his years as a father and grandfather, he has observed nature's wonders along the 562 miles of the Finger Lakes Trail. He's walked it end-to-end. Frequently, he is accompanied by a child or grandchild.



As a member of the Bullthistle Hiking Club, he works to promote hiking and the beauty of Chenango County. In addition, he picks up an ax or saw to clear away limbs that have fallen across the trail and cut away briars ...or paint to mark a visible path for others. Within the hiking community, they're called Trail Stewards; each volunteer cares for a small section of the statewide network. Roger's also a Trail Angel to help out-of-town hikers get back to their vehicles at the end of a hike. He's been donating time to both jobs for many years.

The Finger Lake Trail runs across southern New York, mostly on private land. Several spurs connect the FLT to other regions of the state, providing hikers with an extensive system of marked and maintained paths. The club has drafted guidelines to both protect the land-owners and to promote safety among hikers. You can get details on the FLT website at <u>www.fingerlakestrail.org</u>.

The group's biggest problem? According to Ashworth, it comes when rural land is bought and sold. Then, the group has to negotiate with the new owners to allow hikers to cross their land.

In addition to a short Powerpoint presentation, Ashworth set up a display of assorted hiking gear, some of which is optional. Other items are deemed necessary by serious hikers; he stressed the benefits of a sturdy pair of hiking boots and a trusty walking stick.
