**Program** — Most of us have eaten at the Old Mill restaurant in Rockwell Mills. But today's home of fine dining is just a memory of some much larger mills that once graced that stretch of the Unadilla River. Town of Guilford Historian Tom Gray shared a Powerpoint presentation on the history of Rockwell Mills. His remarks ranged from the arrival of the earliest permanent European settlers to today's effort to get a historic landmark designation.



The site first boasted a grist mill built by Sullivan Reynolds in 1791, back in the days when the Unadilla River formed the border between the eastern whites and the Indians to the west. A cotton mill also developed. Both the business and the hamlet grew and prospered until 1849 when Chester Rockwell moved in from South Hartwick where he had operated a woolen mill with his father. C. W. purchased the grist mill and converted it to a woolen

factory. He continued to enlarge it until about 100 workers were employed. The adjacent railroad allowed the importation of raw materials and the shipping of finished products. Eventually, the mill became very reputable. It was to supply uniforms to Union soldiers in the Civil War, to those heading into the Caribbean for the Spanish-American War, and to inmates in New York's prisons.

Fire destroyed wooden mills three times before the stone structure was erected. Advances in technology dictated the evolution from water-power to steam-power. At times, the mill stood three stories tall. It was abandoned in 1907 and fell into disrepair. All additions except the original stone structure were eventually torn down. The main section was transformed into a noted restaurant in 1946 by Rockwell MacPherson, grandson of C.W.

Gray also traced the growth of C. W. Rockwell's mansion across the highway (NYS Route 8) from the factory. The 17-room building is still in use as a private residence, complete with its spiral staircase in the foyer and its commanding view of the hamlet that bears its founder's name. Work continues on getting the mill and mansion listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

# Linn Tractor Story Hits NewsChannel 34

Jim Ehmke, the channel's News Director, was in town to celebrate Thanksgiving with his in-laws Pete and Merilyn Gould. By prior arrangement, Ehmke brought along video recording equipment and an interview was scheduled for Friday morning. Many folks took time out of their holiday to contributed to the effort. Rotarian Roger opened and secured the building. Jerry Fuchs came over from NE Equipment to drive the tractor across Guy Rathbun Park for some great visuals. Rene Elliott shared his research on the Linn operations in the TV commentary.

In other Linn Tractor news, work continues both inside and outside the renovated building. In the near future, Rotarians Matt and Hank will be mounting solar panels on the roof to provide power to illuminate the tractor. The solar panels are not expected to be obvious from the highway; they will be mostly hidden by a sign atop the building. The building crew also will be installing vents and additional trim before in the weeks ahead.

To complete the inside, Rotarians Joan and Carrie Lynn have reviewed dozens of old photographs in various collections. Eight pictures were selected and have been enlarged to 11" X 17". Then they were put into frames for mounting on the walls with posters and other memorabilia. In addition, a portrait of company founder H. H. Linn will be placed on an easel nearby.
