Next Week – February 08, 2010

Past District Governor **Dave Reynolds** will be here to outline the various Rotary training opportunities scheduled by District 7170 for this spring. <u>Note:</u> The Club Assembly has been rescheduled to later in February.

New Rotary Theme — In announcing the 2010-11 RI theme, President-elect **Ray Klinginsmith** said he arrived at the theme after reviewing RI themes of years past. He noticed that only a few spoke to non-Rotarians.

The theme, "Building Communities --Bridging Continents" was announced during the opening plenary session of the 2010 International Assembly.

If any member objects to his application, President Gary Johnson must be notified in writing by January 31, 2010. **Thoughts To Ponder** — If we take time to absorb what is being said, club members offer very sincere thoughts.

Mary Breuninger, as usual, was thinking of others. After spending an afternoon watching the East-West Shrine football game, ... *I did see Patrick Simonds from Sidney briefly on the field today and one spectacular catch. He was one of "my" students at Sidney Elementary!*

On another topic, she offered ... The newsletter looks great. Thanks for putting in the Papa John info. I talked to Cortland Rotarians and he would have been 83 this week.

Following last Monday's technology presentation, retired school superintendent **Mike Virgil** offered thoughts that had guided the MCS leadership. ...*This is the environment our kids will live in. We need to get up-to-speed and allow the kids to be competitive in their marketplace.*

I also tell college kids who are about to go into teaching that they are old ...and out-of-touch with their students ... before they even get a job. They (the future teachers) need to keep pace with their students' world, not the world that WE know.

Back To The Future, MCS-Style

Program — The computers and technology being used by MCS students was the topic. After dinner, members and guests moved back into the classroom for a program by Leone Schermerhorn and teacher Philip Sheridan.

Principal Schermerhorn praised Sheridan for evaluating potential devices, personally installing equipment, and providing in-house training to encourage other MCS teachers to use current technology. She noted that SUNY Oneonta sends future teachers to Morris to observe the latest classroom techniques. The administrator also pointed out that computers and Smartboards are so versatile they can replace many items that would otherwise be required in a typical classroom. Despite its initial cost of over \$2,300 per room, she viewed technology as "a wise investment" which actually saves the district thou-



sand of dollars.

Sheridan's presentation was definitely "hands-on". After pointing out the features of the Smartboard with a quick Rotary quiz, he distributed to each Rotarian a device smaller than the standard TV remote control. The Rotary "students" then recorded their answers using this unit. The entries were tabulated by the Student Response System, enabling the teacher to evaluate his effectiveness before continuing. The Smartboard, however, was the real star of the show. It's not your grandfather's blackboard! A teacher can do so many things to images created on a Smartboard zoom in or out, use color, highlight, store, print, or post to a website. Attach a camera and the user can view the room, look into the eye-piece of a microscope, or magnify the tiniest object. All with touch-screen speed and ease.

The internet was not neglected. Information was quickly researched and retrieved via Google. Skype allowed the audience to talk to one of Sheridan's former students in the same manner his classes communicated with students at the Chatham Middle School in Massachusetts. And thanks to Google Earth, we took virtual trips up and down the Butternut Valley ...and into New York City.

Finally, Sheridan prepared the Rotarians for what might

be on the horizon. The use of 3-D in the classroom was one of the features promoted at this fall's NYSCATE Technology Conference. (For more info on the NYS Association for Computers and Technologies in Education, go to www.nyscate.org.)
