# **A Grand Anniversary**

Syracuse television station WSYR aired a story this weekend marking the 95th anniversary of one of central New York's older Rotary clubs. The neighboring **Auburn Rotary Club** was founded in 1915.

After Paul Harris formed the original group in Chicago in 1905, the next decade saw the fledgling service organization quickly spreading to the nation's larger cities. In the Empire State, the earlier clubs were formed in New York City in 1909, Buffalo in 1911, Syracuse and Rochester in 1912, and Albany and Binghamton in 1913, Ithaca in 1915, and Elmira and Niagara Falls a year later.

A rash of upstate NY's smaller cities created clubs in 1919 – Amsterdam, Canandaigua, Cortland, Geneva, Fulton, Hornell, Jamestown, Lockport, New Rochelle, Peekskill, Poughkeepsie, Rome, Waverly and White Plains. By the mid-1920s, Rotary's expansion slowed as the nation concentrated on the depression, wars, and other pressing matters. The organization's real explosive growth came following World War II when hundreds of new clubs were formed in the late 1940s and 50s.



Meanwhile, the party in Auburn was a festive ...and a bit historic. Auburn (WSYR-TV) - Members past and present of the Auburn Rotary Club gathered Friday Night to celebrate the 95th birthday of the organization.

Dozens of people turned out for the celebration honoring the club's founding back in 1915. The club is Cayuga County's oldest community service organization.

John Grillo, the president of the Auburn Rotary Club said, "We brought together current Rotarians and Rotarians from throughout the years that have been involved with Auburn Rotary as a reunion, and as a celebration for Rotary's last 75 years servicing the community."

Many local dignitaries came out for the event...including Congressman Michael Arcuri.

Reporter Kathleen Barran, writing in *The Auburn Citizen*, recounted the club's early days and noted some of its major accomplishments.

The Auburn club, with 45 members, was founded on April 12, 1915 in the Palm Room at Osborne House, sponsored by Syracuse Club No. 42. It began service projects immediately, sponsoring 17,000 illustrated booklets about Auburn to other cities. As the club grew, it held picnics for children and helped get Christmas food baskets to the poor. It also assisted veterans of various wars.

In 1920 the club acquired land for a Boy Scout camping site at Owasco Lake, Camp Rotary, which is still used today. Happy Anniversary, Auburn!!!
