Cleaning Highways For A Quarter Century

A group of loyal Rotarians assembled on Saturday morning to scour sections of highways 23 and 51 in the first Adopt-A-Highway clean-up of the year. Chairman **Roger Miller** wanted to get the roadsides cleaned before the rapidlygrowing grass hid the debris.

Participation had fallen in recent years so the club abandoned its usual Wednesday evening clean-up in favor of a Saturday morning session. After meeting at the diner for breakfast, the project started promptly at 9 AM. Despite occasional showers of graupel, two entrances to the village were cleaned - Route 23 by Hillington Cemetery and Route 51 south of Morris Central School. The section of Route 51 north of town will be cleaned at a future date.

Rotarian Roger was familiar with Adopt-A-Highway when it became an official NYS DOT program in the late 1980s. It has become so common that many residents take it for granted. When he went to the DOT office to get the cleanup supplies last week, Miller was told that 70 groups have "adopted" sections of Otsego County highways this year.

Several bags of debris were collected on Saturday by volunteers **Roger Miller**, **Hank Rehrmann**, **Matt Meyers**, **Mike D'Amico**, and **Harry Graves** with **Fred Schwarzhans** carting several bags to the dump. Observations by one of the collectors:

- There are still plenty of beverage bottles, several that were tossed out half-filled,

- Scratch-off lottery cards seem to be getting less popular,
- No valuable ... or really unusual finds ... this year, and
- At least one residence on Route 51 has a septic problem.

Follow-Up — Last November, Sidney High science teacher Richard Townsend gave a program on backyard astronomy. He offered tips that you and your family could use at home to enhance the viewing of the moon, planets, and other celestial bodies.

Sidney is one of the few local school districts to have a permanent observatory with a large telescope on its campus. Townsend said the public is invited to use the facilities several times a year, weather permitting. One of those special occasions is coming up this week as part of the school's Earth Day Birthday Celebration.

The observatory will be open on Thursday, April 22, from 8:30 – 10 PM. Admission is free. Refreshments will be served. The group's publicity says *Our featured attractions* for the night will be the waxing first-quarter moon, Mars, Saturn, and the Lyrid meteor shower. During this session, we will expect from five to 15 meteors per hour. We will have several telescopes available for viewing, including the main scope inside the dome.

The SHS Observatory is located behind the high school building. Drive past the gym and turn right past the pool.

It all started in the Lone Star State.

One day back in 1984, James R. "Bobby" Evans, an engineer for the Texas Department of Transportation's (TxDOT) Tyler District, was driving through Tyler when he observed debris blowing out of the bed of the pickup truck he was following. Alarmed by the incident and concerned that the cost of picking up litter was increasing at an annual rate of 15 to 20 percent, Evans began appealing to local groups to "adopt" a section of highway. His initial challenge went unanswered.

It wasn't long before Billy Black, Public Information Officer for TxDOT's Tyler District, became involved in developing the Adopt-a-Highway program. Black was responsible not only for creating a quarterly cleanup cycle for adopting organizations, but also for implementing the initial concept, which included furnishing volunteer safety training, reflective vests and equipment — and for erecting the wellknown Adopt-a-Highway roadside signs that recognize adopters.

The Tyler Civitan Club soon became the first group to volunteer, adopting a two-mile stretch of Highway 69. The rest, as they say, is history. Within months, more than 50 groups in the region — garden clubs and scouting groups among them — had joined the program, which would blanket Texas and quickly spread nationwide.

Signs recognizing the Tyler Civitans' section of roadway ("First Adopt-a-Highway in the Nation") were erected on March 9, 1985 — a day that has subsequently been named International Adopt-a-Highway Day.

Demonstrating the value of a successful public-private partnership, today Adopt-a-Highway is a grassroots movement involving nearly 90,000 groups in 49 states, Puerto Rico, Canada, New Zealand, Australia and Japan.
