A Felker Adventure In Bolivia

"He's happy, smiling all the time!" That was a proud father's summary of his son's year abroad.

It seems like only yesterday when the Felker kids were regulars at Morris Rotary meetings. Like all of us, they have grown and gone on to new adventures. Chazzman moved from his high school in Pennsylvania to the South American nation of Bolivia as a Rotary exchange student.

And, like most exchange students, he has been visiting many new places. Things are very busy. So far I have traveled almost all around the entire country including Tarija, Potosi, Oruro, La Paz, and Cochabamba. On August 5, I will travel to Benni for ten days for photos and a fishing trip.

Argentina is next on his travel agenda. He'll be leaving soon on an excursion that will last for two weeks.

My Spanish is much better. A few words every now and again I need help with but you will have that.

The one thing from Bolivia that will always stay with me is my trip to Cochabamba and Lake Titicaca. We took a boat to the Isle de Sol (island of sun) where we climbed a very large hill of loose rock and steep sides to find a shamen conducting a ceremony for Pattchimama (meaning mother earth). Burning fresh herbs on a small pile of coals.

He invites Rotarians and friends to share his life through pictures. I have a couple hundred photos on Photo-bucket. If you just look up chazzmanfelker2 it should bring up my profile.

Dad Jeff Felker recently visited to celebrate Chazzman's 18th birthday. In typical Felker fashion, they found time to go fishing. Chazz got the first Pacu ...and the race was on to see who would land the largest.

In a bit of a role reversal, Jeff was now on his son's turf. It was the younger who know the language, the layout of the city, and the customs. It was a bit funny when he had no idea what was going on ... but all went well!



Dad agreed. It was one of the best vacations I ever had. I spent probably 8 hours total being a father and the rest of the week being a tourist with Chazzman as my guide. I could not have imagined not having had him show me around, translate, etc. I can't imagine how it must have been for him to not have the same resource when he moved there.



While there, I visited the Zoo where Chazzman volunteered, his school, and several marketplaces. The markets spanned everything from what we're accustomed to ... to farmers parking there trucks on the sidewalk and shutting down ~20 blocks for a "market".

Former Morris Rotarian Jeff was also struck by the growth that his son has experienced in the past few months. Chazzman is doing amazingly well! He was placed with a very well-to-do family who ironically parent him much like I do. He can do just about anything he wants as long as he understands the details of what, where, how, with whom, and how much. His maturity has gained tremendously as has his popularity, confidence, and general health.

Chazzman has extended his stay 6 weeks beyond his original anticipated return and is traveling South America with members of his host family. He will return to the US in August to complete his senior year and then plans on returning to South America, possibly to go to school for Biodiversity (you'll see a strong theme in his photos).

The Rotary program routinely introduces students to different cultures and new challenges. But, like most others, Chazz sees a dilemma on the horizon. I come back to the U.S.A on August 23. About two months left. I have mixed feelings about coming back. I want to see all my friends and family but, then again, I don't want to leave my friends and family here.
